Judith Kelbie is an independent full-time mediator, trainer, and legal consultant, who has gained a national and international reputation for excellence in personal injury and mediation. Formerly the partner in charge of the Leeds office of a national firm of personal injury solicitors, she has 16 years experience as a litigator specialising in the legal and medical aspects of claims. With a particular interest medico-legal reporting Judith leads training courses for expert witnesses, and advises on the ethical aspects of conduct. She also works with insurers advising on the new claims process. But it is in mediation that she has won major acclaim as probably the busiest personal injury mediator in the country. Now serving her third term as a peer elected member of the Board of the Civil Mediation Council she has worked to integrate mediation into personal injury, with all sides of the industry, the judiciary and with the Ministry of Justice. Jonathan Dingle

Jonathan Dingle is a barrister and mediator specialising in personal injury. He practices through Clerksroom from 64 Bridge Street in Manchester and 218 Strand in London with an equal portfolio of Defendant and Claimant work. Called to the Bar in 1986 following a career at sea in the Royal Navy, he was the Fleet Air Arm's barrister and later served in the Gulf War and as a Judge Advocate before entering private practice in 1996. He has built a reputation as a leading adviser, negotiator, and courtroom practitioner in complex and difficult bodily injury matters particularly involving motorcycle, aviation, and armed forces cases, and chronic pain, brain injury, and career loss matters. As a mediator, his work for more than a decade led to his appointment as Honorary Secretary of the Civil Mediation Council in 2003, a post which he still holds and in which he has played a major role in influencing judges, practitioners, and insurers as to the wisdom and economics of consensual outcomes in even seemingly intractable claims.
